Welcome, Renters!

Dear Renter,

Welcome to Trickey Pond. We are so glad you are here! Whether this is your first year visiting Trickey, or you have been here for decades, we hope that you consider her your summer home. Our pond has pristine waters, and is considered one of the cleanest ponds in Maine. Trickey Pond is home to spectacular wildlife including a variety of birds, mammals and fish. We are home to a pair of nesting loons who will charm you with their songs throughout the day and night!

Here are some guidelines to help you take good care of Trickey Pond while you visit:

- Never litter and please dispose of used fishing equipment properly- you can find a fake bait disposal at the public ramp.
- You may put your boat in the water using our public boat ramps, please inspect for and wash off plant life before entering.
- Maine Law prohibits the use of Jet Skis or other "personal watercraft" on Trickey Pond.
- Obey the no wake zone near the islands- they are for protection of our nesting loons. Please do not disturb nesting loons in any way.
- If your boat is not registered in the state of Maine, you must acquire a Maine Lake and River Protection Sticker from the Town office or at the bait shop on Route 35.
- Children 10 years of age or younger must wear type I, II or II Personal Floatation Device at all times on a watercraft. All vessels, including canoes and kayaks, must have at least one USCG—approved Type I, II, III, or V PFD (life jacket) for each person on board. In addition, one USCG—approved Type IV (throwable) PFD must be on board vessels 16 feet or longer.
- Power boats must pass on the operator's port (left) side, when a power boat approaches a sail boat or non-motorized craft, the non-motorized craft has the right of way.
- Drive slowly on all roads surrounding the pond.

The Trickey Pond Environmental Protection Association (TPEPA) is here to protect Trickey Pond, and to help you enjoy your stay. In addition to educating our families, we also pay for annual water quality tests, and for a boat inspector at our public boat ramp.

We are a non-profit organization and rely on funds from our Trickey Pond family to protect Trickey Pond. We hope that you love Trickey as much as we do, and will support us in our mission. WATER TESTS

One of the primary things the TPEPA funds is annual testing of Trickey Pond's water. We pay an organization called the Lakes Environmental Association (LEA) to perform these tests. We hope that you will continue to support these vital tests.

But what exactly are these tests, and how are they performed? First, to get a sample, the testers paddle out to the deepest part of the lake. This is where a full profile of the water column can be attained without the influence of day-to-day changes in the water. Next, the testers drop what is called a "Secchi disk" in to the water to get a water clarity reading. This is an eight-inch round disk divided into quarters that alternate between black and white. This disc is slowly lowered into the water on a metered tape while a monitor watches it closely through a view-scope, which cuts out overhead glare. When the disk completely disappears, the tape is pinched at the waterline to get a reading. Clear lakes give deep readings while turbid, tea-colored or highly productive lakes give shallow readings. Trickey Pond is one of the most transparent lakes tested by the LEA- it's average clarity when measured by the Secchi Disk is more than 33 feet deep! This is because as a spring-fed lake, the water has already been filtered through the ground.

Next, a temperature and oxygen profile is taken. This is done with hand-held electronic meter. Readings are recorded every meter from the surface to the bottom of the lake. The temperature profile shows the lake stratification and can also indicate whether there is suitable habitat for cold water fish. An oxygen profile can show what state in the year the lake is at, how much biological activity is occurring and whether or not the lake is at risk for internal phosphorus recycling. From the temperature and oxygen profile, the depth of the core sample is determined. The core sample is simply a composite sample of the upper, sunlit water where photosynthesis is occurring. The "core" is taken with flexible tubing that is lowered slowly into the water column, sealed and then brought back up. From this composite sample, individual water samples are taken for phosphorus (the nutrient that controls algae growth), chlorophyll-a (the green pigment found in plants), pH, alkalinity, conductivity and color. During the month of August, individual grab samples are also taken at discreet depths. This is done with a Van Dorn style sampler that can close at specific depths by using a weighted messenger. These grab samples are taken to determine whether phosphorus is being recycled into the upper waters from the sediments.

These tests have been showing worsening clarity and increased chlorophyll trends, putting it in the category of a HIGH degree of concern. We must continue these annual tests to see if these trends are continuing to worsen, and to determine our next course of action!

There are many ways that you can learn more about water, milfoil and the importance of water quality to an ecosystem.

- Take a course, or sign your child up for a class this summer! Classes offered are "Modern Environmental Monitoring" (ages 16+), DIY Sensors and Aquatic Plant ID (ages 15+), and Eco Explorers Day Camps (ages 7-11).

- Perform a Clean Lake Check-Up on your property to make sure you are not causing runoff into the lake. To sign up for a check-up this summer call Colin Holme at 207-647-8580 x 13.
- Request a free property evaluation from LakeSmart, a program that helps you landscape in an environmentally sound way. If your property is shown to be lake-friendly, the LEA will recognize you with a LakeSmart Award and LakeSmart signs to display at your shoreline and on the road. - Train to be a Courtesy Boat Inspector for the Trickey Pond boat ramp! Spend a day sitting by the pond in your favorite chair, with the occasional under boat check! If you are interested in becoming a courtesy boat inspector in the Sebago Lake Region, call Mary Jewett at 207-647-8580.
